Small is Beautiful

Last year's radical change from monthly to quarterly meetings – mainly undertaken for budgetary reasons – does not seem to have adversely affected the council's management of parish affairs. It may even have resulted in greater efficiency, as bureaucracy has a pernicious habit of expanding to fill the time available! The clerk and councillors still attend, as before, to all matters that arise between meetings and are always ready to follow up parishioners' immediate concerns.

Without such a reduction in the frequency of meetings and the consequent reduction in the Clerk's work-load, it would certainly not have been possible to hold the current parish precept to an increase of only 1.7% - well below the rate of inflation. Indeed, a new statutory requirement that all parish clerks should be remunerated at the national hourly rate would have necessitated a staggering rise of virtually 30% - purely for administrative purposes that would have produced no tangible benefit for the parish. Small may not always be beautiful, but in this case it is undoubtedly more economical!

Bus (Dis)service

The council received no more official notice than the rest of the parish (i.e. *less than a week*) of the imminent suspension of all bus services to and from Bletsoe. A combination of private action, press publicity and pressure

from councillors resulted in a public meeting on 4th September at which a compromise solution was proposed – namely a free, bookable taxi-service,

financed by the County Council, to coincide with timetabled Stagecoach services to both Bedford and Sharnbrook. The situation will be kept under review, but the parish council will continue to press for the resumption of *a regular bus service* (however infrequent), as a matter of principle and sound social policy.

Casting Light on the Parish Highways

The parish council's tenacious faith in the power of water to wear away a stone has finally borne fruit, so to speak, in that decades of lobbying for the refurbishment of the village roads has resulted this year in the resurfacing of both Memorial Lane and Coplowe Lane, as well as the extensive patching of the upper reaches of Bourne End Lane. After several years of unsatisfactory 'partnerships' with private companies, the County Council has now reassumed prime responsibility, under the brand name 'Bedfordshire Highways, and aims to bring the condition of the county's network up to the national average by the year 2009. Under the Highways Maintenance Partnership Scheme, the £3000 apportioned to the parish was earmarked for the replacement and adoption by the County Council of the street lighting in Memorial Lane, which will result in a reduction in electricity and maintenance charges. The old posts have still to be removed, and local reaction to the new lighting has not been entirely favourable, so the council is not intending at present to pursue the adoption of the rest of the parish's lighting stock, which would inevitably result in a proliferation of poles, since current regulations do not permit telephone wires and lighting to share the same standards. It is therefore likely that the allocation for the coming year will be spent on the resurfacing of further stretches of footway, but the council will be pleased, as always, to receive specific suggestions from parishioners.

Play Area Refurbishment

Thanks are due to David Martin and other public-spirited villagers for substantially rebuilding the Wendy House that continues to serve as a shelter and play-room for the younger children. In addition, two of the swings have recently been renewed by Wicksteed Leisure and repairs have been undertaken to the climbing wall

parents are asked to ensure, as far as possible, that their youngsters treat the play area with respect.

and perimeter fence. Damage to the fence and the incidence of hazardous litter, such as broken glass, continue to be a concern, and parents are asked to ensure, as far as possible, that their youngsters treat the play area with respect. The council is still pursuing the possibility of providing a hard surface, or at least a basketball facility, for the older children.

Dog-Fouling

The council has investigated the provision of Dog Litter Bins, but the reported cost of £300 per bin would seem to be prohibitive, especially as the emptying service would involve an additional charge. We therefore continue to rely on the good offices of responsible dog-owners to ensure that deposits are hygienically disposed of. Apart from the health hazard, fouling is both unpleasant and anti-social, and is legally an offence that can incur a fine of £50.

Tree Warden

Apart from some nibbling by neighbouring horses and a few losses through drought, the hedge planted by volunteers along the western boundary of the Parish Field is establishing well. It was the final initiative of our Tree Warden, Richard Day, before he moved from the village and handed over the baton/bough to Paul Forster, who has kindly agreed to continue this valuable work.

On Your Bikes

Prompted by the withdrawal of the Stagecoach bus service, the council has urgently renewed an earlier request for a cycle-track/footway between Bletsoe and Milton Ernest to complete the pedestrian/cycle link between Sharnbrook and Bedford. County Councillor Tom Wootton, who has cabinet responsibility for Highways, has undertaken to pursue the matter on our behalf when priorities for extending the cycle network are considered.

Conservation Area

Appropriately perhaps, conservation is not an issue that progresses with any speed! However, after a lapse of more than a year, there now seems to be some movement by the Borough Council to follow up David Baker's offer to draw up proposals for establishing a 'Conservation Area' within the village of Bletsoe. If all goes according to present plans, residents should receive a consultative letter within the next few weeks, to be followed by a public meeting on Monday 4th December, when the extent and implications of the Conservation Area will be fully considered.

Tree Planting


Once again the County Council is offering tree and hedge plants for small or large schemes within the village.

That will be very expensive, way beyond the village's means and will require grant applications plus extra fundraising, should this be the case.

For the moment we wait to see what the position is, whilst saying thank you to everyone who has been so helpful by supporting our events over the past year. We hope to see you at the next event, a concert by Cantamus on 9 December!

Are you entitled to Pension Credit?

Pension Credit is an entitlement for people aged 60 or over and it could mean extra money for you every week.

You are likely to be entitled to Pension Credit if your weekly income is less than $\pounds 114.05$ if you are single ($\pounds 174.05$ if you have a partner).

If you are 65 or over, you may be rewarded for saving for your retirement, up to $\pounds 17.88$ a week ($\pounds 23.58$ if you have a partner).

County Council Report

I have now represented Bletsoe as your County Councillor for almost 18 months and I would like to take the opportunity to thank the residents of Bletsoe for the help and support they have given to me since I was elected. I am really enjoying meeting and working with you and I will continue to support and campaign for you in any way that I can.

Our most recent campaign was following the complete withdrawal by Stagecoach, of the Bletsoe bus service. With the help of County Council officers and feed back from residents I hope that I have managed to find a solution that will at least allow residents to access vital services in Bedford and Sharnbrook. Whilst not ideal I hope that it alleviates some of the problems caused by Stagecoach's decision. The County Council is now looking at registering the service as an official taxi bus and when this is completed there will be a published timetable and residents will no longer have to book their ride. Please let me know as soon as possible if there are any changes to the current timing of the taxi, or if you have any other comments or views on this service.

For your information: The County Council operates a help line for the general public to report highways problems or queries. If you see for instance, broken paving, a street light not working (or on all the time), a pothole, a water leak or a broken services cover then please report it to the County Council help desk on **01234 228661.** Your call will be logged and you will be given a reference number which you can use if you want to track the progress of your query. You can also report potholes and streetlight problems on the County Council web-site (www.bedfordshire.gov.uk) At the end of each week your Parish Council and I receive a full report of all calls and emails logged and their progress.

There is a similar system operated by the Borough Council for environmental problems. Call **0800 121 8888** if you see fly-tipping or abandoned vehicles or if you want to request a service such as pest control, bulky waste removal or report a missed refuse collection.
